### From the Rectory Study

There have been many Hollywood films which have been set in and around courtrooms. For example, *A Few Good Men* starring Tom Cruise, *JFK* starring Kevin Costner, and *Kramer vs Kramer* starring Dustin Hoffman and Meryl Streep. We also have TV programmes like Judge Rinder and Judge Judy. Do you remember one of the most famous court cases from 1998? One journalist reflected "It was the court case that rocked the country. One woman, wrongly imprisoned for fraud, had the whole nation calling for justice." She became known as the Weatherfield One and it was a major storyline in Coronation Street.

On a more serious note, courts are very necessary things. Their purpose is to uphold and enforce the law, to deal with everything from misdemeanours to some of the most awful atrocities. In recent months our news headlines have been dominated by the legal cases involving former President Donald Trump in USA.



In a few weeks we will be journeying through Holy Week once again and that journey will draw our attention to the trial of Jesus - or *trials* may be more appropriate. These were not held in a courtroom, as we would define it. Rather, they took place in the presence of regional rulers and the outcome of these trials would be eternally significant. As our attention is drawn to the

events of Holy Week, we encounter Jesus standing before Pontius Pilate, the Roman Prefect who ruled Judea, Samaria and Idumea. He was then sent to Herod, the Tetrarch of Galilee, where he underwent a second trial. In both cases no evidence was found against him.

This all sounds like we are dealing with one of those 'mistaken-identity' cases. However, having been found innocent, Jesus was not released. He was handed over for crucifixion. We could easily conclude that these were show trials where the guilty verdict was almost inevitable regardless of the evidence. Yet, this was all in keeping with God's wider plan. Jesus had to die, despite his innocence, so that through believing in him we can be forgiven for the wrongs that we have done, so that we don't need to stand guilty before our righteous God.

Jesus was aware that the agony of the cross awaited him (Luke 18.31-33). He also knew the eternal importance of the sacrifice that he was going to make – "...the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Matthew 20:28). That 'many' includes you and me. This Easter let us give thanks to God for His immeasurable love, His amazing grace and the eternal hope that He offers each of us.

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#### Holy Week 2024

This year, the title of our Holy Week journey will be **'Remarkable.'** Since September we have been looking at Mark's Gospel in our Bible Study and we will reflect on selected passages from Mark 14-16 during Holy Week 2024. We will focus on the well-known Holy Week story and be reminded about what makes it truly remarkable.

Each weekday evening at 7.30pm we will meet for a worship service. On Easter Sunday morning there is also the opportunity to join with neighbouring congregations for our Easter Dawn service in Bellevue Zoo Carpark at 6.45am. The various themes and service types for Holy Week 2024 are as follows.


**Easter Sunday (31<sup>st</sup> March)** Easter Sunrise Service (6.45am at Bellevue Zoo Carpark)

parishioners who avail of the dial-in facility and they faithfully listen to the Sunday Service and Bible Study each week.



#### Prayer Fellowship

I love how God uses various ways to get our attention. With Moses it was the burning bush, for Pharaoh God used the plagues, and for Jonah it was the big fish. For me, many years ago, God used humour in His word. Up to that point I had never thought of God as having (or using) humour to reach me. Today I am glad He did.

I remember reading about Job's sad experiences - a time when he lost all that was dear to him. His friends were not very helpful in their attempts to encourage him or to bring him solace. One of them was called Zophar and in the midst of his self-righteous effort to comfort Job he said, "For an empty-headed man will be wise, when a wild donkey's colt is born a man" (Job 11:12). The humour of this, sarcastic as it might be, caused me to laugh and to realise that God has a sense of humour. To this day I think of the things God has taught me and I take joy in this knowledge. Seeing the many facets of God in His dealings with me still surprises me and leads me to experience an inner joy in every situation.

I have discovered that, in prayer, God has often used humour, encouragement and gentle rebuke, but it is always coupled with His great love and challenge. This is clearly revealed in His written Word, but if we don't read the Bible we may never get to experience the many ways that God speaks to us through His Word.



One powerful way of developing our prayer life is to learn to pray God's Word back to Him. This turns our times of prayer into a progressive and ongoing conversation with God. These conversations become exciting, they raise our awareness of God's faithfulness to new levels, and they create in us a desire and determination to converse more often with God. I have found this to be a very powerful way of praying. The more we put this into practice the more we find ourselves praying with ever-

increasing faith and with greater understanding. It is God's very nature to answer prayers of faith based upon His Word.

Within the Prayer Fellowship there is always the opportunity to bring any question you may have and to put into practice this way of developing your prayer life. You are more than welcome to join us any Wednesday evening at 7.30pm in the Pentecost room for a time of fellowship in prayer.

#### **Guild of Lesson Readers**




The reading rota for the next two months can be found on Page 4 of this magazine. Any changes to allocated readings can be made by speaking to either of the churchwardens.

#### Antrim & Newtownabbey Street Pastors

I recently received an email from the Ascension Trust thanking me for making a donation to a 70-year-old man who is running a half-marathon in Brighton. Many men and women of this age and stage of life enjoy running and participate in such events. In my younger years I was a runner but I wouldn't attempt such a task any longer! For those of you who do not know, the Ascension Trust is the governing body of Street Pastors and it is the body that awards our licence and authority to call ourselves Street Pastors in Antrim and Newtownabbey. I have copied the main text of the email because it describes the role of Street Pastors simply and effectively.

It's not every day that someone chooses to go on a 14mile run to raise money for charity on their 70<sup>th</sup> birthday, but that's what Jonathan Leeson will be doing. Jonathan, who lives in Ringmer, near Lewes, will be taking part in the Brighton Half Marathon on February 24, to raise money for Ascension Trust – the umbrella organisation for the well-known national initiative Street Pastors. He aims to raise £50,000. This will be the second time that Jonathan has run a half marathon. He ran his first one at the age of 54 in response to a challenge by a friend who believed he could do it. Jonathan serves as a Street



Pastor volunteer in Brighton and was previously part of the Street Pastors team in Tunbridge Wells, Kent.

Street Pastors are trained volunteers and work in partnership with the Church, Police, Local Authorities and those involved in night-time economy. Based in over 250 towns and cities across the UK, Street Pastors teams give out bottles of water, chocolate, and flip-flops to the homeless, and those struggling to walk in their high heels - as well as provide a listening ear to those who are vulnerable, or who are unwell as a result of drug taking or consuming too much alcohol. Street Pastors aim to give people they encounter on the streets a real sense of being valued and cared for. Prayer is also offered to those who ask for it, as well as those who would appreciate being prayed for. There is clear evidence that when Street Pastors patrol a community, there is a 30%-40% reduction in crime. Streets are safer when Street Pastors are out on patrol. Jonathan says, "I love going out patrolling with my Brighton Street Pastors team. We often go down to the beach or meet people outside the club to offer flip flops, support and prayer if needed. It's worthwhile work and it's the reason why I've decided to undertake a second half marathon to raise money for a charity that is making a real difference. In the community."

The Church of the Holy Spirit is one of the churches who were responsible for bringing Street Pastors to Antrim and Newtownabbey. I would like to thank you for your support and would ask for your prayers in allowing that to continue.

We are thankful for this generous support.

At our meeting Mr John McQuillan informed us of his intention to stand down from the Mission Committee. We were all saddened to hear this news and thank John for his commitment and dedication to the work of Mossley Mission Group.

On Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> February we hosted a soup and cheese lunch after the 11am service. This was really well attended and we were delighted to raise £355. Sincere thanks to everyone who helped out in any way and to everyone who came along.



On Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> February 2024 the Rector took part in Friday Night Live. This was an evening of reports and updates from South America and a recording of the event is available on the SAMS Ireland Facebook page and YouTube. Written reports will also be available in the next copy of the SAMS Ireland *Buena Vista* magazine.

The Friends of Tansen annual report for 2024 was released in mid-February. It is an excellent overview of the ongoing work of United Mission Hospital Tansen and has sixteen pages packed full of stories and insights. It can be accessed on the following website <u>www.umn.org.np/umht</u>

During the past year, hospital admissions in Tansen have risen to 12,470. Over 105,000 outpatients were treated and 6758 operations were undertaken. Some of the future needs of Tansen Hospital include:

1. Items such as a large autoclave machine, replacement delivery bed, CLIA machine for lab, mobile x-ray machine, and laparoscopy set.

2. Big projects such as the long-term building plan and a CT scanner on our list.



3. Long term personnel, particularly an IT consultant, a fundraising manager (for both UMN MDT hospitals), a Pathologist, a Radiologist, GPs/ Family Practice doctors, an ENT surgeon and often other specialties, too.

Please do continue to pray for the ongoing work in Tansen Hospital and South America. Thank you so much for your support of our mission partners.
